Activity	Before the activity begins, make up	
	strange names for aliens. The alien

	with the same initial sound, for	
	example:

	Write them down.	
	Talk to the children about the names	
	saying them lots of times with a	
	giggle and help them to imagine what	
	the strange creatures might look	
	like. Provide creative or construction	
	materials for the children to make	
	their own alien.	
	Make the pattern clearer by	
	emphasising the initial sound of an alien's name. Draw the children's	
	attention to the way you start each	
	word with the shape of your lips,	
	teeth and tongue.
